(Rules and the "Ruler of the Heart")

Questionnaires regarding information ethics show high rates of smartphone ownership among fifth-and sixth-graders. Many fifth- and sixth-graders report that there are no rules for smartphone use in their households. This is different from the perception of adults. At Nanzan Elementary School, we have made "SNS Nanzan Rules" based on the "SNS Tokyo Rules" established by the Tokyo Metropolitan Board of Education.

~SNS Nanzan Rules 2022~

- 1. Set specific times and purpose of use, and use after consulting with family members.
- 2. Decide with family on times and places when SNS is not to be used. (Rest your eyes.)
- 3. Never post personal information about yourself or others. Do not contact strangers.
- 4. Consider the feelings of the recipient and make sure of the content before sending the message.
- 5. Talk in person if something is important or difficult to say.
- 6. Be careful when handling other people's photos and works. (Copyrights and portrait right)
