Results of the School Evaluation Questionnaire (Term 2)

The new year has begun, and as usual, our school held the New Year's calligraphy event. The first and second graders used 4b pencils, while the third graders and above used brushes. Each student wrote with great care, and the results were wonderful and refreshing. We would like to express our gratitude to the parents and community members who had the opportunity to view the students' remarkable works at the calligraphy exhibition.

Now, we would like to thank you for your cooperation in the second-term school evaluation parent questionnaire. Regarding the results, when compared to the first term, when combining "strong agree" and "somewhat agree" as positive evaluations, and "combining strongly disagree" and "somewhat disagree" as negative evaluations, the overall positive evaluations have increased. For example, in question 4, "The school does not overlook student's problems, concerns, or troubles, and makes efforts to prevent bullying and absenteeism by offering advice and guidance," the positive evaluation increased by 6%, from 79% in the first term to 85%. We believe this reflects the positive impact of the school's actions. Additionally, in question 6, "The school works to foster interest in sports and the arts through interactions with athletes and music concerts," the positive evaluation increased by 5%, from 93% in the first term to 98%. This increase likely results from the many opportunities provided in the second term.

In other areas, there was no significant change in the proportion of positive evaluations. However, for all items, the percentage of "very applicable" evaluations increased. Notably, in question 2, "The school provides lessons that are 'understandable' and 'fun," the percentage of "very applicable" responses rose by 15%, from 46% in the first term to 61%. In question 3, "The school places importance on teaching the values of recognizing and caring for others through events, moral education lessons, interactions with the community, and greeting activities," it increased by 12%, from 66% to 78%. In question 4, "The school addresses student's problems, concerns, or troubles promptly, offering advice and guidance to prevent bullying and absenteeism," it increased by 14%, from 38% to 52%. These increases reflect more positive evaluations, likely based on parents observing their children at school or hearing about school life from them at home. We will use this feedback to continue improving our efforts going forward.

Currently, the school is working on creating the curriculum for the upcoming school year. As you may already know, starting next year, a pre-class will be introduced for all new first graders in Minato City. Additionally, the second term will be shortened by two days, ending on December 23. We will continue to ensure the quality and quantity of lessons while also considering the work-life balance of our teachers. We kindly ask for your continued understanding and cooperation.

The Minna Eco Committee is working to solve environmental issues by thinking about what students can do and carrying out awareness activities within the school.
