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#### Reflecting on the First Term Evaluation

One month has passed since the start of the second term. There is a Japanese saying, "Atsusa samusa mo higan made" (The heat and cold last until the equinoctial week), and true to that, the intense heat has finally begun to subside, allowing us to feel the signs of autumn.

In school life, due to the ongoing turf construction on the schoolyard, students have been spending their recess time in the gymnasium and on the rooftop. For physical education classes, we are using both our school's gymnasium and the grounds and gymnasium of Roppongi High School. Despite these temporary changes, the students are enjoying their school life calmly and pleasantly. Across all arade levels, students are engaging in a wide range of activities such as neighborhood exploration, visits to the planetarium, rice harvesting, and social studies field trips. Additionally, thanks to the support of parents and community members, students have had the opportunity to participate in various events, including the PTA event on September 6 and the Autumn Festival on September 13 and 14. We are truly grateful for the role that families and the local community play in raising the wonderful students of Nanzan Elementary School.

We would also like to thank you for your cooperation with the first term school evaluation. Regarding the results of the questionnaire, overall, there were no major differences from last year in the percentage of positive responses (combining "strongly agree" and "somewhat agree") or negative responses (combining "strongly disagree" and "somewhat disagree").

Looking more closely at the results, for Question 4, which asked whether the school makes efforts to prevent bullying and absenteeism by identifying and addressing student's problems and concerns through counseling and guidance, 80% of respondents gave a positive evaluation, up slightly from 79% last year. Notably, the percentage who answered "strongly agree" rose from 38% to 46%, an 8% increase. For Question 8, which asked whether the school is working to improve and tailor its teaching and support systems to meet the needs of each student—including promoting special support classes and creating an environment where all students can learn in a way that is accessible, understandable, and enjoyable—the overall positive response rate was 80%, up from 78% last year. The "strongly agree" responses increased from 43% to 52%, a 9% rise. We believe this reflects recognition of the increasingly effective collaboration between the school, families, and related organizations in supporting our students. Furthermore, for Question 10, which asked whether the school's communications—such as notices to parents and the school website—are clear and appropriate, 95% of respondents gave a positive evaluation, up from 93% last year. The percentage who answered "strongly agree" rose from 56% to 67%, showing a 9% increase. We will continue striving to ensure our communications remain clear and informative.

On the other hand, for Question 1, which asked whether the school conducts lessons that encourage collaborative learning and mutual recognition, creating a safe environment for students to express themselves and develop basic academic skills, the overall positive response rate was 93%, slightly up from 92% last year. However, the percentage who responded "strongly agree" declined from 60% to 53%, a 7% decrease. This may be due to students still adjusting to the new dual-track lesson model introduced this year in Minato Ward. We will continue to improve and refine our teaching methods in response.

Application for Placement in the Special Support Classroom (First Term, 2026~27 School Year) Special Needs Education Coordinator

Our school operates a Special Support Classroom (Step Room) to provide individual support for students who may have developmental concerns. This classroom is designed to help students overcome and improve challenges they may face in daily life or learning. Parents or guardians who wish for their child to attend the Special Support Classroom are asked to consult with the homeroom teacher, the Special Needs Education Coordinator, or the Vice Principal by October 6 (Mon).

## Grade 1
