Human Rights Education

Student Guidance Department

At our school, we provide instruction related to human rights throughout the year in classes, events, and various situations in school life. This year, the sixth graders engaged in learning in which they thought about human rights and wrote essays. The student who was selected as the representative presented their essay at the "Children's Human Rights Message Presentation," an event for elementary school students within the Tokyo wards. Themes the students consider when thinking about human rights include "a world without bullying," "ten people, ten colors — everyone is different, everyone is good," "the importance of greetings and individuality," "discrimination should never happen," "let's respect diversity," and "each person's individuality is one of a kind."

December 10 is World Human Rights Day. From December 4 to 10 is "Human Rights Week," during which each class will conduct moral education lessons related to human rights. We will provide guidance so that this becomes an opportunity to once again think about cherishing the rights that allow people to live humanely.

Initiatives for Fureai Month

November was "Fureai Month," a period aimed at preventing problem behaviors such as bullying, absenteeism, and violence before they occur, and at promoting the healthy development of students. At our school, each class created anti-bullying slogans, giving students the opportunity to think about bullying themselves and renew their commitment to the belief that bullying must never be tolerated. In the final week, the students looked back on the slogans they had created and reflected on what concrete actions they were able to take based on them. Through the initiatives of Fureai Month, we will continue to strengthen our efforts to prevent bullying so that school remains a place where everyone can feel safe and secure.

Grade 1

Grade 3

OOn December 9 (Tue), during Integrated Studies, students will participate in a community graffiti-cleaning activity together with staff from the Azabu District General Branch Office and the police. While creating the safety map, students said that places with graffiti are often dangerous because they are "in areas that are not very visible" or "visible but ignored by everyone." As part of our efforts to reduce dangerous spots in our town, we will remove graffiti in these areas. Since this is an outdoor activity, please make sure your child dresses warmly.
