Aiming for Definitive Learning

Beginning from the previous school year our school introduced the "Standards of Study" and "Nanzan Style" which are aimed at achieving establishing academic discipline and greater improvements in academic activities across all of the grades. These have been set in place as how everyday instruction should embody "Experiencing the Joy and Fun of Learning" as taken from the School Management Plan.

The "Standards of Study" are the student's basic attitudes towards studies and school life. There are 6 points to engage in at school, such as greetings at the start and end of class, proper posture, and the Koeno Monosashi (voice volume), as well as 2 points to be engaged in at home, which include preparing school supplies and doing homework, and the standards consist of 8 points altogether.

The "Nanzan Style" shows 4 styles to be used for the contents of academic activities in each subject. For example, conducting lessons with the "Grasp→ Think→ Expand→ Summarize" styles will develop the students' abilities to think and make judgments. Also, at the Expand step their thinking and judgment are further deepened through mutual interaction via "pair, group, and whole-class discussions.

In these ways, via engagement throughout the school, students will have their own ideas, expand upon those ideas, and deepen them so that we nurture "Children who can learn, think, make decisions and express themselves independently." Please refer to the school's homepage for details.
